SCOPE

1. This Assurance Review aims to assess Senator Hanson's use of parliamentary business resources to undertake travel to and within Sydney in June 2022 (the relevant period).

PURPOSE

This assurance review aims to determine the dominant purpose of the travel that was undertaken by Senator Hanson for the relevant period.

BACKGROUND

3. On 14 October 2022, the Sydney Morning Herald published an article titled, 'Pauline Hanson bills taxpayers for defamation case trip' (Attachment 1).

- 4. The article claimed that Senator Hanson was in Sydney to attend the Federal Court in relation to a defamation case brought against her by a former One Nation colleague, and that she had used taxpayer funds for flights and COMCAR.
- 5. A review of Senator Hanson's travel data for June 2022 indicated she accessed parliamentary business resources to fly from Brisbane to Sydney on 9 June 2022, and took 2 COMCAR trips within Sydney on 9 and 10 June 2022.

LEGISLATIVE FRAMEWORK

- 6. The relevant legislative framework (Framework) comprises the following:
 - Parliamentary Business Resources Act 2017 (PBR Act)
 - Parliamentary Business Resources Regulations 2017 (Regulations)
 - Parliamentary Business Resources (Parliamentary Business) Determination 2017 (Determination)

Obligations

7. The principles based legislative Framework imposes a number of obligations on parliamentarians in relation to their use of public resources. In summary, parliamentarians are personally responsible and accountable for their use of public resources. They must be prepared to publicly justify their use of public resources for conducting their parliamentary business and must act ethically and in good faith in using, and accounting for the use of, those resources. Specifically, a parliamentarian must not claim public resources unless they are claimed for the dominant purpose of conducting their parliamentary business.

Definitions

- 8. "Parliamentary business" has the meaning given by section 6 of the PBR Act. Activities that fall within the 4 duty streams of parliamentary business are set out in the Determination as "parliamentary duties", "electorate duties", "party political duties", and "official duties".
- 9. Subsection 6(2) of the PBR Act further provides that an activity is not the parliamentary business of the member if it is carried out for the dominant purpose of providing a personal benefit to the member or another person or pursuing commercial purposes of the member or another person (or both).

ANALYSIS

- 10. IPEA obtained data in relation to travel for Senator Hanson, covering the relevant period.
- 11. Based on available information, Senator Hanson used parliamentary business resources to travel to and within Sydney for the relevant period. IPEA notes she did not claim travel allowance during these periods.
- 12. On 28 October 2022, IPEA wrote to Senator Hanson to ask about her parliamentary business in Sydney for the relevant period (Attachment 2).

- 13. As no response was received, a second letter was sent on 18 November 2022 (Attachment 3).
- 14. As no response was received, a third letter was sent on 1 December 2022 (Attachment 4).
- 15. On 5 December 2022, a staff member from Senator Hanson's office called to discuss the recent letter and advise that a response would be provided by Senator Hanson.
- 16. On 8 December 2022, Senator Hanson sent a response to IPEA's letters (Attachment 5). The Senator's response stated the dominant purpose of her travel to Sydney for the relevant period was parliamentary business, as she was required to attend court for a matter related to comments she had made on the floor of the Senate in her capacity as Senator for Queensland and incidents that had occurred in Parliament House involving her staff.

CONCLUSION

- 17. On the basis of Senator Hanson's response, in relation to her travel to Sydney in June 2022, IPEA is satisfied the dominant purpose was parliamentary business and was not inconsistent with the Framework.
- 18. IPEA notes that under the Framework, parliamentarians "must be prepared to justify publicly their use of public resources for conducting their parliamentary business" (subsection 25(3), PBR Act).

Every three months, we get a reminder that politicians have the privilege of being able to put all manner of perks, from travel to accommodation, on the taxpayer dime, thanks to the Independent Parliamentary Expenses Authority. And the latest data has a few juicy tidbits.

First, an honourable mention to One Nation leader **Pauline Hanson**. After nearly being weeded out of the Senate by the Legalise Cannabis Party, and disappearing after a bout of COVID, she returned to the public eye at the Federal Court in Sydney for a defamation case brought against her by ex-One Nation colleague **Brian Burston**. Flights and Comcar travel from Brisbane were all paid for by the taxpayer.

Despite quitting parliament ahead of the election, former Northern Territory Senator **Sam McMahon,** whose home is in Katherine, was the biggest spender on travel allowance, charging \$38,621 for 96 nights away from home between January and May. We get the NT is big, but those frequent \$457-a-night stays in Darwin really do add up.

George Christensen used his final months as an MP to get a bit of help setting up his wannabe media empire, spending nearly \$20,000 worth of your money on high-quality video streaming software. We bet he made some cool stuff with that!

Former finance minister **Simon Birmingham**

topped the domestic frequent flyer list, charging \$32,000 in air travel, much of that coming during the election campaign.

Little surprise that the biggest spenders on overseas travel were ministers from the current and former governments. And Greens Senator **Sarah Hanson-Young**, who charged \$7710 to attend the COP26 climate conference in Glasgow last year.

Cultural Exchange

We were intrigued by news on Thursday that Australia's very own National Stock Exchange (NSX) had signed a joint venture agreement with Saudi Arabian corporate giant Ajlan & Bros to establish a second securities and commodities market in the kingdom.

Intrigued because NSX (not to be confused with the ASX, which is Australia's proper stock exchange) has had as long association with **John Karantzis**, the Aussie-Cypriot businessman whose brushes with authorities – the Tax Office, the Australian Securities and Investment Commission and the ASX itself – have made him a staple of the nation's business pages.

We know the Saudis have had their PR problems of late but we can't help wondering if they know what they're getting into.

Which may help explain some of Dominello's recent investments – he has bought shares in **Elon Musk's** SpaceX. Given the multibillionaire's rocket ship company isn't publicly listed,

Dominello would have had to go through the process of buying off a private shareholder.

He also recently bought cryptocurrency – Bitcoin and Cardano to be precise. It hasn't been a great year for either, with Cardano hitting a 21-month low. Not the most lucrative investment for a post-parliamentary career.

Climbing Everest

Nature Strip is odds-on to defend his crown at the \$15 million Everest Race in Sydney this Saturday. But among the upstarts hoping to pip the champion is three-year-old Jacquinot.
